The Hoosier Herpetological Society welcomes Stacey Summitt-Mann as our guest speaker for February. Stacey is in her fourth year of teaching at University High School in Carmel. She has taught a variety of courses including biology, zoology, and animal behavior as well as being the girl's varsity basketball coach. Stacey graduated from Butler University in 2009. She has worked with herps' since she was a child and in college did research on the small mouth salamander (Eagle Creek) and the red-eyed tree frog in Panama.

Stacey will be presenting Biomimicry as a design method that invents new, sustainable products based on nature's champion organisms. In this interactive discussion, Stacey will present new ideas and products that have been inspired by amphibians and reptiles. She will also describe the process of this innovation method and explain how little characteristics we notice in herps could be the next big answer to some of the world's problem

## Herp of the month "Purple Python" by Ed Ferrer

Whenever I do my educational snake programs, one of the questions that is often asked is "What is the largest snake in the world?"

I say that the question has two answers depending on the way largest is meant. If weight is the deciding factor then the answer would be the green anaconda, *Eunectes murinus*, of South America because this specie is known to reach a length of close to 30 feet but since it is an aquatic species supported by water its weight reaches up to an estimated 450-500 pounds. But if length is the deciding factor then the reticulated python, python *reticulatus*, from Southeast Asia with a record length of 32 feet 9 inches found in 1915 takes the title. In my opinion this serpent is one of the most beautiful snakes in the world. The normal appearance is an intricate pattern of black lines surrounding blotches of olive green and white circles on a grey background. "Reticulated" comes from the Latin word meaning net-like as the black lines form a pattern similar to a net or chain-link fence. The scales give off a fiery iridescence when reflected off sunlight which adds to its beauty. When I first started into my hobby these large, beautiful snakes had a bad

reputation for being very aggressive because most of the animals were nervous wild caught specimens and were probably disease ridden. But after many generations of captive breeding, particularly when a "tiger retic" emerged with a more docile temperament they became more common in the pet trade. Bob Clark, a world famous breeder from Oklahoma, after many attempts was finally successful in producing albino reticulated pythons! These animals were basically yellow and white snakes coming in three forms out of the same clutch of eggs. One form has lavender highlights, one form has purple highlights and the third form is just yellow and white. I have seen all forms at the reptile shows in Tinley Park, Illinois and they are all strikingly beautiful! Of all three, I think the form with purple highlights is the most beautiful.

#### Herp Tip

Heat and humidity is easily lost this time of year due to the warm dry conditions in our homes. Your herps depend on these two conditions to survive. A good way to keep heat and humidity inside your cages is to cover the top of the tank with a rigid plastic or foam. Heat rises and therefore, it is being lost almost as soon as it is created. It would be advised to leave room for air exchange. Misting or spraying enclosures twice a day is also a good way to aid in humidity.

## **KNIVES AND HERP ART (Part 25)**

This knife is pretty cool. It has a snake "breathing fire" in the shape of the blade. It is twenty-one and one/quarter inches long from the tip of the blade to the tip of the tail. The blade is ten and three/quarter inches long from the tip to the back of the snake's mouth. The blade and the end of the tail, which is three and five/eighths long, is red with a black border. The snake's body is a black plastic with the head and part of the tail a silver color with the fangs black. On one side of the blade just inside the mouth is etched "XL 1350 STAINLESS STEEL HANDCRAFTED IN CHINA" and, on the other side of the blade is etched "TOMAHAWK" which I assume may be the name of the manufacturer. This is a fantasy knife that does not have a cutting edge.

#### REPTILES AND OTHER PET MAGAZINE TITLES HAS BEEN SOLD BY BOW TIE

The business world is buzzing over the sale of Bow Tie, Inc., publishers of *Reptiles* and a number of other pet-related magazines and books. Bow Tie had recently closed several of its publications, and one, *Thoroughbred Times*, declared bankruptcy last fall.

A newly formed joint venture between Mark Harris, co-founder and co-owner of National Publisher Services (NPS), and David Fry, chairman of NPI Ventures LLC and CTO of Fry Communications, called I-5 Publishing LLC has acquired the books, magazines and websites of special interest publisher BowTie Inc.

Terms of the deal were not released, but Harris and Fry ballparked it at \$10 million-plus. Included in the sale are *Cat Fancy, Dog Fancy, Pet Product News International, Horse Illustrated, Urban Farm,* AnimalNetwork.com, DogChannel.com and books like *Dog Heroes of September 11th* and *The Original Dog Bible*.

What does this mean for the future of *Reptiles* and other former Bow Tie properties? In a media release quoted in *Folio*, Harris, who is serving as interim CEO of I-5, said: We seek to expand content and make it available on all platforms. We believe in further investing and bringing in more expertise to the company to help raise the bar for us....

We'll be looking at growing topline revenue with brand extensions and the introduction of new products... We're open

minded to partnerships, which will be a big priority, as well as further developing the existing digital strategy. We think there is a very large opportunity there.
