October Meeting Program Review

On October 26th Jim Horton presented a program of the herping field trip he and Pat Hammond took through northwest Florida this past May. Dan Dourson invited them to stay at his research site in the Cedar Keys. They stayed one night in an off grid cabin (featuring a lot of what Floridians call "water bugs" (actually roaches). That night they saw the red eyes of an alligator shining in the darkness in the pond so they cancelled their plans of exploring the pond the next day. They found several dead snakes on the roads, Gulf Hammock rat snakes, water snakes, a corn snakes and a dusky pigmy rattlesnake. Jim apologized to the scouts for the somewhat gruesome shots but he explained when out herping any dead species should be counted as finds. Among the live "herps" found during their two day stay were several anoles, green tree frogs, a scarlet snake, corn snakes, a southern ringneck snake, and a mud snake. They also found a few Florida cottonmouths or water moccasins which have a much more attractive banded pattern than the Western cottonmouths found in our area. Other species found were a Florida mud turtle, scarlet king snake, blue phase garter snake, Gulf Hammock rat snakes, and a black racer. One morning they investigated some turtle traps and found three turtle species, yellow bellies, stink pots and mud turtle. Once they were documented they were released.

They also went kayaking in the Key Island area. Traveling in the Apalachicola National Forest they found Gulf coast box turtles, an Eastern ribbon snake and tree frogs. At St. Vincent Island they found a large alligator on the beach in the surf. They also found another Florida cottonmouth, a broad head skink and some sundew plants.

Besides the herps, since Jim is also interested in plants. He included some photos of many beautiful flowers and other plant life that added to the presentation. They ended their trip searching the Apalachicola National Forest by finding Jim's favorite carnivorous plants, sundews and pitcher plants, and several species of orchids. During the trip Jim was pleased to be able to find some species for the very first time which he called "Lifers".

HHS SUR VEYS CROWN HILL WOODLANDS

HHS members Dale Schoentrup and Jim Horton met with Don Miller, Land Steward for Indianapolis Parks and Recreation to inventory a local woodland.

The Indiana Forest Alliance is fighting to save an old growth forest in Indianapolis. The particular site is now owned by the Department of Veteran Affairs and is planned to be cleared for a memorial for Indiana veterans. The Forest Alliance argues that this particular site is a treasure and that there are trees over 300 years old within it.

The Forest Alliance has been surveying the area for rare plants and wildlife. The HHS helped survey the area in late October. The season for amphibians and reptiles is coming to an end, so the results were scarce. One smallmouth salamander (Ambystoma texanum) was the only herp found.

With the possibility of more regulation and setbacks, the site could remain intact for some time. If so, another survey could yield more species in spring.
